(Continued from Page One) In the second grade alone three teachers handle 100 half-day session students. The instructors are Mrs. Lovina Sheehan, Miss Davida Matier, and Miss Dorothy Monchiff. A combination of 21 second and third graders is taught by Mrs. Margaret Chandler.

THIRD GRADE
In the third grade—there are 102 students. Teachers are Mrs. Joanne Wolla, Mrs. Eva Thomas, and Miss Margaret Lawrence.

Principal Crecellus pointed out that these double day sessions are necessary even though the Board of Education has done everything in its power to pool existing resources.

"As an example," said Crecellus, "the new Greenwood school is built kitty-corner from Fern Ave."

COMBINATION MADE
He pointed out that this was done so that Greenwood could share a combination auditorium-cafeteria at Fern Ave. This is technically known as a cafeteria. At noon, it is used as a cafeteria and during the day as an auditorium. Tables fold out of the walls during the lunch hour.

"Even with the Board's attempt to save space and money by staggering schedules so that two schools can use the same facilities and by combining the use of cafeterias and auditoriums," said Crecellus, "there still isn't enough room to go around to house all the students at Fern Ave."

Grocery Chain Robbers Escape

A grocery chain store in Torrance was robbed Sunday of an undetermined amount by two bandits, Police records at the Torrance Police Department showed today.

A clerk that works at the store said that he was waylaid as he left the downtown market about six-thirty.

He was threatened with a pistol and forced to drive to Crenshaw Blvd., north of Carson St., and meet the second thug.

The two made the clerk divulge the safe combination, took the store keys and one returned to the store while the other kept the clerk there at gunpoint, it was reported.

Discovering that they could not open the safe, they forced the clerk to direct them in the opening of the safe.

After the money was stolen, the bandits calmly marched the clerk down the business area streets for about 10 minutes.

Following the walk, the clerk was driven to his car to Carson St., near Maple Ave., trussed with adhesive tape and placed on the floor of the auto. The bandits tossed the clerk's keys away in near-by weeds and left him. He managed to painfully tear his bonds loose, locate the keys and summon police.

The entire incident took almost two hours.

(Continued from Page One) mate, Torrance should receive nearly \$49,000 as a result of the special census. He reported that it cost the city in the neighborhood of \$3700 for the special nose count.

Three districts were reported as complete by Spiker. These are the area surrounding the airport. In this area, there appeared to be 200 fewer residents than recorded during the 1950 census. Spiker explained that Army barracks were moved out of this location—accounting for the decrease.

Two other areas now complete are the location bounding 190th and Sepulveda on the South and Madrona on the East and the city limits on the South. The other area is bounded by Sepulveda on the north, by Arlington in the east, city limits on the south, and Crenshaw on the west.
