County Report Sought

An investigation of why taxes levied against the General Petroleum Corporation's Torrance refinery have consistently fallen off for the past several years, despite major mprovements to the properties, was Tuesday night demanded by Councilman Nick Drale, seconded by Councilman Willys Blount, and passed unanimously by the Coun-

Drale pointed out that despite over \$2 million worth of improvements and major construction in the last two years, the assessed valuation of the holdings has dropped approximately \$1,100,000.

According to city records, General Petroleum building permits totaled \$847,750 during 1951, and \$1,147,000 thus far in 1952. City Manager George Stevens revealed, however, that the County Assessor's evaluation of the property fell \$1,000,000 in 1951, and over \$100,000 this year. Torrance, thereover \$11,000 in taxes last year. This year's tax figure has not as Anticipated revenues climbed to yet been set, so it is unknown how much loss will be realized.
