City to Act on Cabrillo Beach Parking Fees

The Los Angeles City Recreation and Park Commission has set Monday, June 30th, as the date it will act on the recommendation of George Hjelte, general manager of the City Recreation and Park Department, that a schedule of parking fees be put into effect at Cabrillo Beach, San Pedro.

After hearing protests against the proposal from a delegation of

San Pedro residents, the Commission adopted Commissioner Maurice Luxford's motion that a joint committee be appointed by Acting Commission President C. Tony Pereira and Councilman John S. Gibson Jr., 15th District, the committee to include Pereira and Gibson, to further consider the parking fee problem and report back to the Commission by Monday, June 30th.

Hjelte's recommendation to the Recreation and Park Commission concerning installation of parking

fees at Cabrillo Beach provided that a fee of 50 cents per car be charged Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, and 25 cents on other days, with the understanding that during the slack season, when there is little demand for parking space, no charges be made.
