To be owned by the federal government, but built and operated on a cost-plus basis by Harvey and several other large manufacturers of raw industrial materials, the gigantic factory will be located at the corner of 190th St. and Western Ave., across from the existing Harvey facility.

The tract of land, said to be between 40 and 50 acres, is in escrow now, according to a representative of the Dominguez Land Company, from whom Harvey is purchasing the property. Unofficial, but authoritative reports, set the purchase price at \$16,500 per acre. A Harvey spokesman said that the two buildings to be erected will be over ten stories high, and will cover ten acres of ground, having a total floor area of over 400,000 square feet.

The plant will probably be in operation early next spring, according to the Harvey spokesman. No prediction could be made as to the effect on the local employment situation, but it is rumored that a considerable number of local workers will be employed in building and operating the industrial center.



Suit Names Baldwin, Carley, Defendants; Asks Share of Assets
