Local Red Cross leaders announce a standard first aid class scheduled to be held at Torrance branch of the Red Cross, 1754 Torrance Blvd., Monday evening, July 7, 7 to 10 p.m.

Instructor M. Ferguson in urging as many residents of this vicinity to "sign up" as possibly can and gives the following reasons why they should:

1. To prevent accidents. Experience shows that people trained in first aid are safety conscious and their accident rate is lower than that of untrained per-

2. To train people to do the right thing at the right time. A first aider is not expected to make a physician's diagnosis, but he has the knowledge to determine the nature and extent of an injury, and he knows what to do

3. To prevent added injury or danger. First aid prevents further contamination and infection of wounds. It lessens the likelihood of shock or helps to control it. Knowing what not to do is as important as knowing the proper measures to take.

4. To provide proper transportation if necessary. Many accidents occur at points far removed from medical aid. Care must be taken to employ the correct methods in moving the injured so as to prevent further injury.

5. To comply with the recommendation of civil defense authorities who urge residents to acquaint themselves with the arts and skills of "self help" so as to be prepared for any emergency natural or atomic.
