Registration for the six-week summer session at Harbor Junior College will be held on Monday, July 7, from 1 to 8 p.m. in the college library, J. Reyburn Hatfield, summer session director, said today.

Twenty-five classes, including Applied Accounting, Business Mathematics, Biological Science, General Botany, General Drafting, First Year Composition and Reading, Survey of European Literature, Foods and Nutrition, Man and Institutions, College Trigonometry, Life Science, Machine Bookkeeping, Office Machine Practice, Calculating Machine Practice, Introduction to Office Machines, Photography, Recreational Activities, Printing, General Psychology, Hygiene, Typewriting, Shorthand, Filing, and Sociology will be offered.

All courses are tuition-free, will carry regular college credit, and will be offered during the hours from 4 to 10 p.m. daily. Any person 18 years of age, high school graduates, regular junior college or university students, and teachers desiring salary point credit are eligible to enroll in the Tech summer session classes.

## College Board OKs \$2,000,000 Budget

The El Camino College Board of Trustees approved a tentative budget of \$2,311,034 for the 1952-53 school year with nearly half of that amount allocated to construction of permanent classroom buildings and for equipment.

The largest item in the budget, aside from the funds set aside for the building construction, is \$686,182 for instructor's salaries and other costs of instruction.

Operation and Maintenance of the school plant calls for an expenditure of \$178,890 with \$150,000 set up in general and undistributed reserves.

In accordance with legal requirements the tentative budget will be submitted to the County Superintendent of Schools and returned to the district board for further consideration with the public hearing on the budget scheduled for August 5 at 2 p.m.
