Huge Crowd Expected At Fireworks Display

PORTUGUESE BEND-Between 25,000 and 35,000 persons are expected to perch in the natural hillside bowl above Portuguese Bend Friday evening as the Portuguese On Carrier Bend Club presents its fourth annual Fourth of July Fireworks display from the end of the club pier.

The event, starting at dark, will@ feature high-soaring rockets and aerial torpedoes which will burst high above the waters of Catalina Channel. To enable the public to see the show from the Palos Verdes hills, emphasis is placed on highaltitude pyrotechnics rather than ground displays. The fireworks show will include only three set pieces which will glow from the end of the darkened pier.




