At the meeting, Darby was presented with a letter from the City Council of Torrance offering the County the present city court facilities at a \$1 per year rental basis, so that the people of Torrance, Gardena, and Lomita could best be served in traffic matters.

Chief of Police of Hermosa Beach, and Torrance Police Chief John Strob, who indicated that a serious hardship would be imposed on the various police departments if they were forced to transport prisoners from one place to another. Additional personnel would be needed and the city would be forced to purchase adequate transportation for the prisoners.

Revenue Loss Stroh also pointed out that while the City of Torrance had derived a revenue of approximately \$65,000 in traffic violations alone, under the new plan, 'We will be lucky if we receive \$15,000."
