Drale also pointed out that streets, curbs and gutters were not being installed in front of all new school buildings. He asked if that should not be included in the bids submitted for school building contracts, rather than relying on the city to do it. Dr. J. H. Hull, Superintendent

of Schools, stated that curbs and sidewalks were being installed at most of the new schools, but that he felt the streets should be installed by the city. He pointed out that city crews can do this far more cheaply, than the schools can.
