

Donald Armstrong Named to Local Community Chest Post

Donald Armstrong, local attorney, has been named to head this year's Community Chest campaign in Torrance, it was announced yesterday by Sam Levy, Harbor area chairman.

Levy, the Torrance civic leader who this year returns to the post he held in 1950, last year served as chairman of the Torrance Commerce and Industry unit, while Armstrong acted as vice-chairman of the city campaign.

Last year Armstrong also served as city chairman of the Palos Verdes Estates appeal. He lives at 812 Via Conejo there.

The new city chairman will direct the activities of more than 400 volunteers who will raise funds for the 160 Red Feather health and welfare services in the greater Los Angeles area.

Quota Topped
Torrance last year became the first city in the Los Angeles area to meet its quota in the residential division. The residential workers went over the top on their first day, marking the first time that the Harbor area had executed successfully a one-day campaign in any one segment of the Red Feather appeal.

Levy also announced yesterday that Jack Dabbs, who last year served as city chairman for the Torrance campaign, would this year act as Harbor area vice chairman.

Dabbs, manager of a theater chain in Torrance and Gardena, lives here at 1640 Juniper Avenue.

Recreation Commission Established

City Council Tuesday night adopted an ordinance establishing a Recreation and Playground Commission for the City of Torrance.

The ordinance calls for a seven-member commission, with the mayor and city manager serving as ex-officio members.

The commission is compelled by law to meet at least once monthly. Appointments will be made by the mayor with the council's approval.

Funds for operation will be allocated by the city, and reports of commission activity and the recreation program progress will be made to the mayor every three months. An annual report will be submitted to the council.

SPORTSMAN'S CALENDAR

The Department of Fish and Game reminds California sportsmen of the following general regulations which apply to current hunting and fishing:

DEER — August 9 to September 14 in Coast Range counties generally between Glenn-Mendocino and Orange-Riverside (central coastal and south coastal areas). Bag limit: 2 bucks. Season begins September 22 elsewhere.

BEARS — August 9 to December 31 in central coastal and south coastal deer hunting areas; September 20 to December 31 in balance of State. Bag limit: 2 bears per season.

JACK RABBITS — Opens September 1 in southern California districts 4, 4 1/2, 4 3/4, 19, 20 and 22. No closed season elsewhere. No bag limit.

TROUT — No closed season in Colorado River Area. Ends October 31 elsewhere. Bag and possession limits: 15 trout, salmon or whitefish, or combination.

BLACK BASS, SUNFISH, CRAPPIE, SACRAMENTO PERCH — Bag limits: 5 black bass, 25 sunfish, crappie, perch combined. Local exceptions.

CATFISH — No closed season. Bag limit: 15 fish. Night fishing permitted in Siskiyou, Shasta, Lake, Modoc, Tehama, Butte, Glenn, Colusa, Yuba, Sutter and Inyo counties, and in Pit River, Lassen County.

STRIPED BASS — No closed season. Bag limit: 5 fish or 25 pounds and one fish, or 2 fish regardless of weight. Minimum size limit: 12 inches.

SHAD — No closed season. Bag and possession limits: 5 fish. Angling hours: one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset, or by hand dipnet at any time.

OCEAN FISH — No closed season for tuna, yellowtail, marlin, broadbill swordfish, black sea bass, barracuda, white sea bass, bonito, rock bass, sand bass, kelp bass, halibut, corbina, croaker, lingcod, and cabezone. Bag limits: 15 in aggregate, but not more than 10 of any one of other species listed above, nor more than 2 marlin, swordfish or black sea bass.

OCEAN SALMON — Bag limits: three trout, salmon or combination in Pacific Ocean north of Monterey-San Luis Obispo county line; two fish south. Minimum size: 22 inches; one undersized fish permitted.

Dispute Stops Columbia Mill For One Day

Grievance committeemen from the United Steel Workers and industrial relations representatives for Columbia Steel are meeting this week in an effort to settle a dispute over split work schedules.

The 22-inch and 36-inch rolling mills at the plant were shut down last Saturday as 30 men on the C turn and 28 men on the B turn failed to show up for work.

Workers are demanding that their days off be consecutive instead of split, and took Saturday off so that they might have a two-day week-end.

An official of the steel firm stated that representatives of both union and management are making every effort to work out the problem, so that it does not recur again this week-end.

The spokesman pointed out that because of the backlog of defense orders resulting from the recent 53-day steel strike, an increased working schedule has been necessary, and it is not possible to turn out the work unless some of the men take a split week.

Fact Finding Group OKs Annexation

Representative from industry, homeowners, and the Carson Chamber of Commerce met Friday at the Lone Pine Inn to hear a report of the Citizens' Water Fact Finding Committee on the proposed annexation of the area to the West Basin Water District.

William Salyer, secretary of the committee, outlined tax costs and the benefits of annexation to a group of 15 local men, a committee member reported.

It was disclosed that the committee endorsed the annexation.

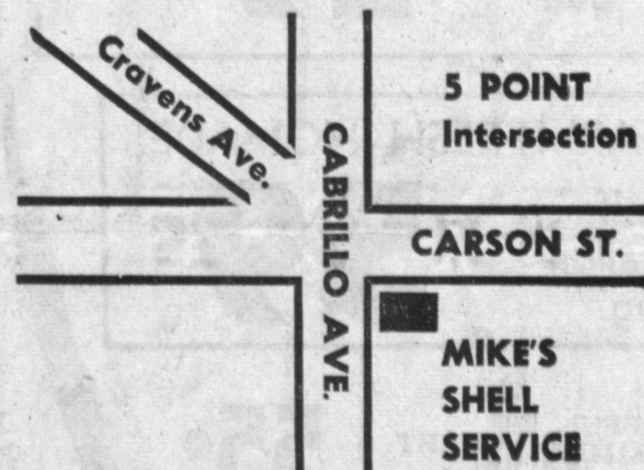
