At the same time the Council will set the tax rate.

Despite protests that have been lodged against the proposed 30 hike in the tax rate over last year, indications are that the Council will OK both the budget and the tax rate as proposed by City Manager George Stevens.

Assessment Up Opponents of the tax raise have pointed out that the city assessment is up \$5,000,000 over last year and that sales tax, license fees, and various building permits are expected to climb during this
