Illinois Governor Adlai Stevenson proved to hold a lead of 8 per cent over General Dwight Eisenhower in a straw ballot tally conducted ast week by the Torrance

Stevenson garnered 380 votes, while Ike pulled up with 349 Torrance supporters, according to the results of the poll.

Registration figures from the June 3rd primary election indicated that there are 3 registered Democrats for every 2 persons registered as Republicans. In the 1948 presidential election, registration figures indicated that there were twice as many Democrats at that time as Republicans in Tor-

The tally, therefore, shows a slight upsurge in enthusiasm for the Republican candidate this year.
