Here Are 23 Propositions on Lengthy Ballot on November 4

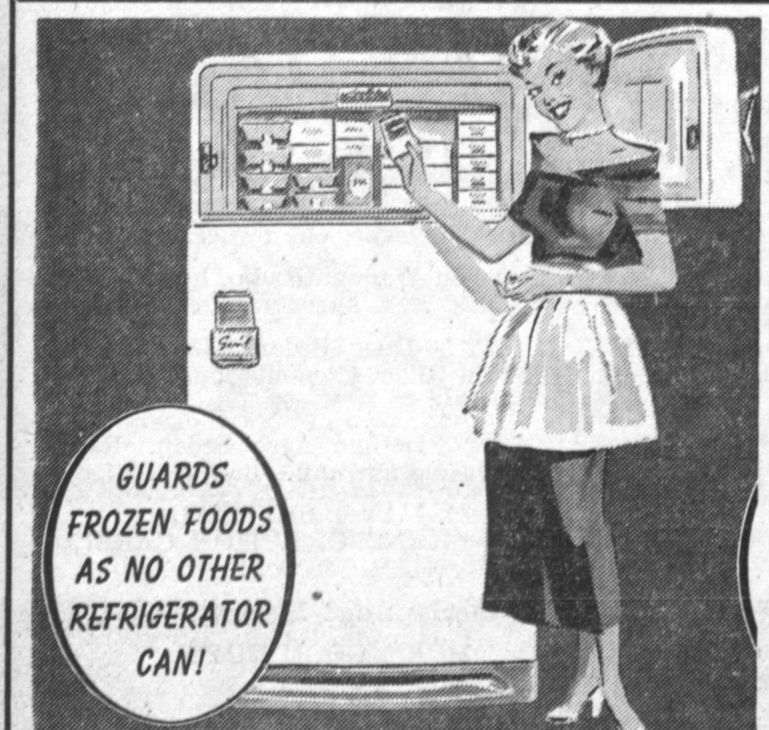
Twenty-three ballot propositions on subjects ranging from old age pensions to loyalty oaths will confront California voters at the Nov. 4 general election.
The complete list of propositions and the order in which they appear on the ballot has been released by California Secretary of State Frank M. Jordan.
Here are the propositions as they appear on the ballot:

Cpl. Ewell with Ordnance in Korea

WITH I CORPS IN KOREA.—Cpl. William J. Ewell, son of Mr. and Mrs. William F. Ewell, 1610 265th St., Harbor City, is serving in Korea with the 538th Ordnance Medium Automotive Maintenance Company.
A holder of two Meritorious Unit Citations, the 538th recently celebrated the beginning of its third year in the combat zone. It is the only unit on the peninsula equipped to maintain the Army's new M-135 hydromatic truck that is being tested in the mountainous Korea terrain.

Corporal Ewell is serving as a carburetor and ignition mechanic. He entered the Army in November, 1950, and arrived in Korea last February.

1. Veterans Home Loan Bonds.
2. Increased state support for public schools.
3. Ask repeal of a recent state law exempting nonprofit private schools from taxation. (This is a referendum, and requires a "yes" vote to uphold the law as passed by the Legislature and signed by the governor.)
4. State grants to needy blind could not be considered as a support for any of their spouses or other persons.
5. Would ban persons advocating unlawful overthrow of the government from holding public office and would disqualify them for any tax exemptions.
6. Loyalty oath for public employees.
7. Would require that a candidate's party registration be designated on the primary election ballot.
8. Exempt churches under construction from taxation.
9. Exempt colleges under construction from taxation.
10. Would prohibit use of public funds for lobbying. This is another McLain-sponsored measure.
11. The McLain pension proposal. It would also provide that all but federal contributions come from state rather than local funds.
12. Would permit state constitutional officers to retain their posts while in the military service.
13. Would prohibit crossfiling in state primary and special elections.
14. Would remove constitutional restrictions on Chinese.
15. Relates to taxation of insurance companies and banks.
16. Would permit the borough form of city government.
17. Revises state regulations governing activities of chiropractors.
18. Would provide that portion of increased taxes due to the added value of property where a redevelopment project is established shall be used toward paying off debts of the project.
19. Regulates grand juries.
20. Regulates granting of state funds for hospital construction.
21. Establishes new rules for filling vacancies on Superior Court benches.
22. Would make false statements of property ownership for tax purposes a criminal offense.
23. Gives Legislature blanket authority to provide for assessments of all lands.
