At the end of the regular registration period, a record on-campus and branch college enrollment of 1,222 students was recorded at Harbor Junior College, William H. McMasters, dean of admissions and guidance, announced today.

Of the 1,222 regular students registered, 581 were enrolled in regular day classes, 451 were enrolled in extended-day classes, 22 were taking classes offered at Harbor General Hospital, and 168 were registered for classes in a new branch college at Westchester High School.

The local junior college, which started its fourth year of operation on Sept. 15, is currently offering some 213 different courses, including lower division university classes, business education courses, and courses providing technical training.

Previous high in registration was 875 students enrolled at the end of the regular registration period in Sept., 1951, McMasters said.
