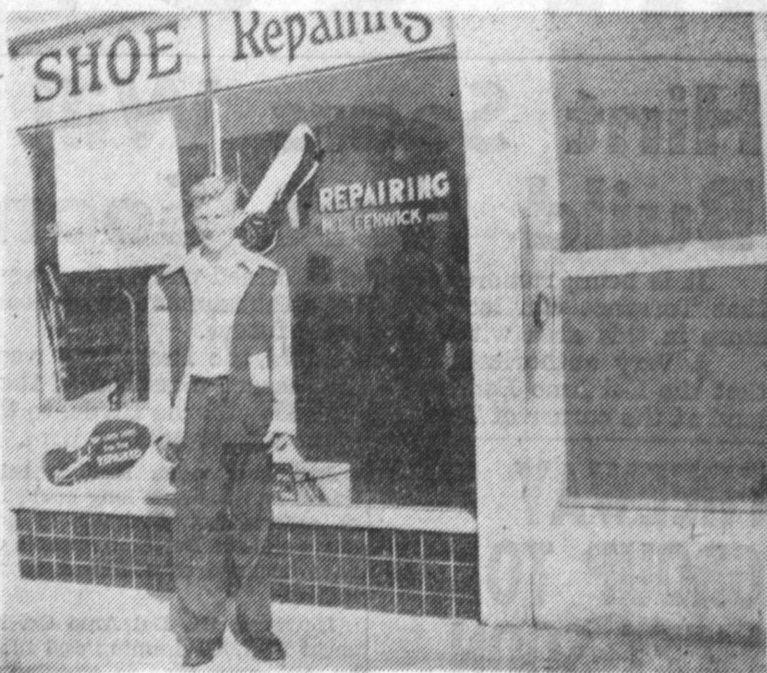

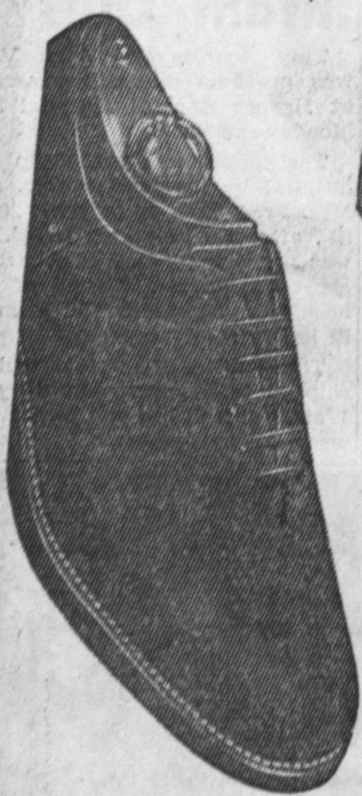

Hallowe'en Party Enjoyed at McMaster Park

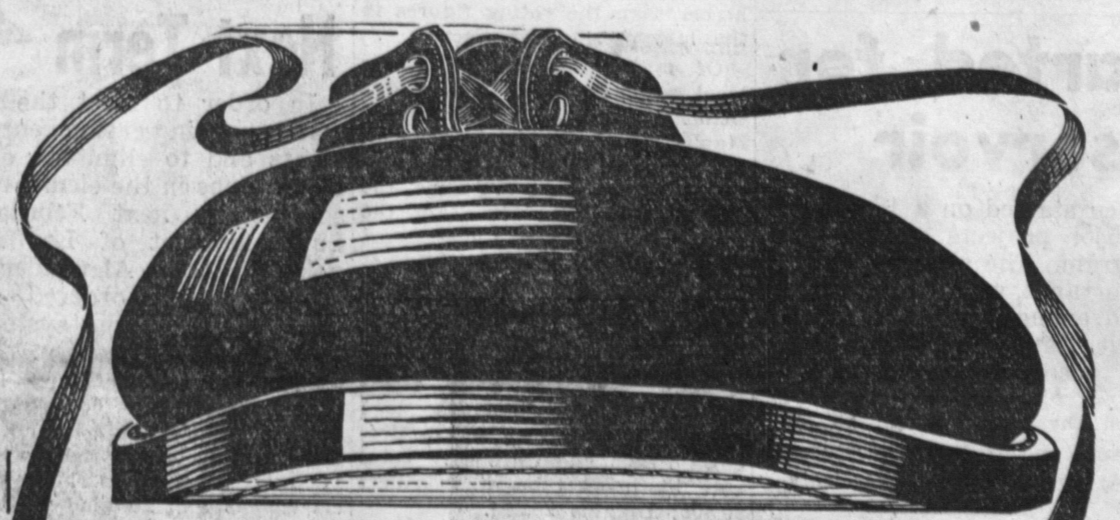
