

Red Cross Blood Mobile At Torrance in January

With the Red Cross Blood Bank Mobile Unit due sometime in January, questions and answers about the blood bank and blood donations have been supplied by Mrs. Don Hyde and Mrs. Mel Howard, Blood Recruitment chairmen for the drive.

They are as follows:

Q. Why should anybody be asked to give his or her blood?

A. For the use of Armed Services, for Civilian hospital use and for stock piling for Civilian Defense.

Q. Where are the blood donations taken?

A. Our next community Red Cross Blood bank in January (date to be announced later), Civic Auditorium.

Q. Who takes the blood?

A. Physicians and registered nurses only are prepared to take your blood.

Q. Is any special preparation necessary?

A. Eat your meals as usual the day of your donation and be sure to have nourishment within four hours of the time of your appointment.

Q. How much blood is taken at one time?

A. One pint.

Q. How long does it take?

A. It takes approximately five minutes. The donor is then requested to rest ten or fifteen minutes. Following the taking of blood, donors may go about their business normally.

Q. Who may give these blood donations?

A. Men and women between the ages of 18 to 60 years of age. Young men and women under 21 years of age must have release signed by parent or guardian. Donors must weigh 110 pounds or over.

Q. Is there any pain or discomfort in blood taking?

A. None.

Q. Can I give a second blood donation?

A. Yes, in three months.

Q. Is it necessary to be typed?

A. No.

Q. How can I arrange to give a donation?

A. By telephoning Red Cross headquarters, Torrance 3447 or 3448, or by coming in and signing up at 1754 Torrance boulevard, Torrance, Calif.

A comparison of the old and new rates, just completed by the company rate department, is shown in the table below. You can determine the approximate increase you can expect in your monthly gas bill by taking the cubic foot usage from your most recent bill and finding the comparable charge on the table:

State Stalls On 101 Hiway Traffic Aids

Despite repeated efforts by this city to have traffic at three intersections along Pacific Coast Highway channelized no further work has been heard from the state.

Recently G. T. McCoy, state highway engineer, announced that plans for the channelization of traffic at Hawthorne blvd., Roberts rd., and Paseo de Gracia have been completed and sent to Sacramento for approval.

City Manager George Stevens said today that the city will continue efforts to hasten the much-needed work. The large-scale development of homes in the area along the highway has increased the traffic to such a degree that an actual hazard exists now, he stated.

State officials have declared that traffic signals at the Roberts rd. and Paseo de Gracia intersections are neither desirable nor justified. Signals already exist at Hawthorne ave.

The channelization would be similar to that installed early this year at the highway intersection with the east end of Newton st. The raised concrete dividers here provide protected lanes for autos making left turns off the busy highway.

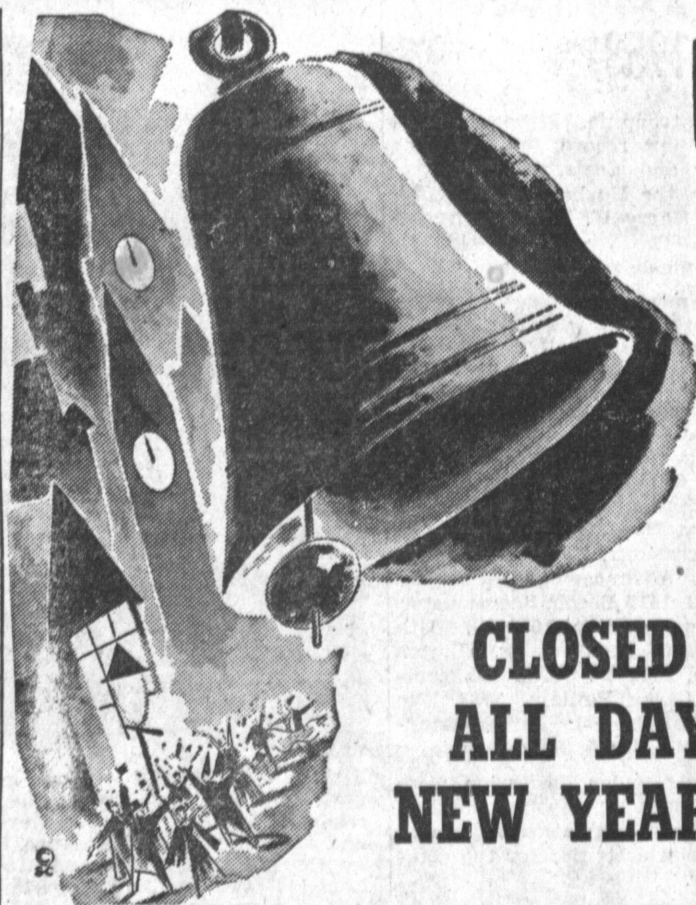
Clubs Urged To Visit Blood Bank
