The city council next Tuesday night will hear a proposal by City Manager George Stevens that plans be made to take special census to dermine the exact population this city,

The possibility of Torrance getting its own municipal court, or even a court session here, is contingent upon a bill to be introduced before the state legislature by local Assemblyman Vincent

The Thomas measure would assure either a court or a court session for all cities over 40,000 pop-

In the event that the bill passes, stevens told a Press reporter, the city will press for a special census immediately.

He pointed out, though, that even if Thomas' bill is vetoed the city will still seek the census. Additional gas tax revenue and other monies from both county and state would be forthcoming from nore up-to-date population fig-

Assemblyman Thomas has pledged his support in the drive to get a court in Torrance.


