Torrance is growing at such a pace that it seems that the "powers that be" can't keep up with the normal requirements of a community.

It is time that the recreation program of the city cease being a political football, and that the resources of the community logically due the program be sed for recreation for all - children nd adults.

Money Available When we say, "resources" we mean the money available in the both school and city budgets which can and should be used for after school, Saturday, Sunday and vacation recreation programs.

There is sufficient money now within the reach of the city and schools to establish a good, sound, beneficial rereation program of this type — and the city Council and Board of Education owe it to the children of the community to bring about such a program.

If this editorial is to be taken as

critical of any political body of the community, let us say that we feel that neither group (the Board of Education nor the City Council) has taken hold of the need, viewed it unselfishly - and neither has come up with a sound, workable program. Why? Jealousy of one olitical body for the other.

We also know that the schools have the land, the playgrounds, the facilities which can be thrown into a program without additional cost for "parks", "playgrounds" and other facilities such as proposed by the city when considering the various additional taxes a few years ago.

Surveys "Filed" Yes, the city's recreation budget of \$40,000 a year, thrown in with the school's facilities and its money on a well - grounded, well thought - out program, could work and would work, if given a chance.

The City of Torrance has had many recreation "surveys" made, and the council has simply received the reports and "filed" them. All of them have suggested, we understand, joint programs with the schools. Take Long Beach, for instance, which has been operating on a coordinated city and school recreation program, set up in the City Charter, for 25 years. It is a worldbeater. It was designed by an out-oftown recreation expert, who made the last recreation survey, now long forgotten, for the City of Torrance.
