Arthur Sues, chairman of the Citizens' Committee for Better Recreation, appeared before the board and pointed out to the commissioners that both funds and facilities for the immediate establishment of a recreation system that would serve the children, youth and adults of this city are available. If the city and the schools are brought together this can be achieved, he said.

Recreation Director Frank Carpenter stated Tuesday that a good recreation program that would serve the needs of the community could be set up here now by fully exploiting existing facilities and funds. He indicated that a long-range park planning program was essential, but that a yearround recreation system could be developed immediately.

Adequate Program

Money to initiate this set up is available now, Sues pointed out. If the money already allocated by the city and the county, and funds easily available through the schools are combined in a joint program, administered by the schools, this city can have an adequate program now, Sues declared.

Pointing out that the city has rever had a good recreation program due largely to bad administration, he stated that the most practical and economical way to run the program is under the direction of the schools.

Black History

The city, meaning both the city council and past recreation commissions, has a notorious history of botching up recreation here, he charged. It is time, he added, that we got a good program lined up with good administrators.
