Second Hearing *Needed

The City Council Tuesday night passed, an ordinance designed to exact a park fee on all new developments here, despite the heated protests of two of the Council-

The bill, which will not become a law until a second hearing is held on April 28, was recommended by the Torrance Recreation Commission for use in establishing a chain of small parks throughout the city.

Reasons Cited

At Tuesday's stormy session, Councilmen Nick Drale and Victor E. Benstead protested the bill for two reasons: 1. they contend that the bill is unfair, discriminatory, and improperly drawn up; 2. they charge that their three council colleagues are trying to ram rod the bill through the council. The measure calls for a \$100 per gross acre fee on all new housing tracts

Councilman Drale stated that when the bill originally appeared pefore the council on March 24, he and not received a copy of the ordinance for study. The measure died then, when it was discovered that a four-fifths vote was needed to pass it as an emergency ord-

Shoved Thru Council He alleged that the bill is now being shoved through the council as a regular ordinance requiring only a two-thirds vote.


