Radios Fail In School Rooms Here

schools use the radio in their classrooms, a recent survey by the Board of Education revealed.

In analyzing why radios are being used so infrequently here, Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools, reported that teachers are finding it difficult to schedule classes around the available educational programs. Dr. Hull pointed out that the county sponsors a series of radio programs designed to implement the educational pro-

gram of the schools. He expressed the belief that the county-sponsored programs have not received sufficient publicity and that teachers do not seem to consider them useful for their par-

ticular purposes. Educational television would not only encounter the same problems confronting educational radio programs but would be faced with such other problems as control, finance and personnel, the chief administrator said.
