Direct Dialing From now on dialing will be direct, swift, and efficient, and Toccance residents will not have to place their calls with the operator any more. Not only will dial-happy citizens find this a great relief but they will enjoy the further privilege of calling the outlying areas directly by dial, without the intermediary services of an operator. It is in this respect that the new system is almost unprecedented.

Pre-cutover tests of the maze of switches indicate an extremely low percentage of error, Hayes indicated today. All is ready to "kill' the switchboards in the old nondial office and simultaneously cut the new dial office into service.

The wire chief said the main reason for making the cutover at midnight is to take advantage of the low volume of calls normally placed at that time.

Switchmen in the old office will jerk fuse-like "heat coils" from equipment, then will signal the wire chief in the new office that his part of the job is completed.
