Survey Plans Johnston said that an organizational meeting including Torrance, Los Angeles, Redondo Beach, and Los Angeles county will be held within the next ten days to make plans for the industrial waste survey. Not only are the sumps hazardous as far as animals and people are concerned, but the present method of letting the water and oil seep into the ground has proved to be a fresh water pollution danger.
