Flagrant Violator CITY SUES GRAVEL FIRM **3 Violations**

MAN, 82, COMMITS SUICIDE

An 82-year-old man shot himself through the heart with an old, rusty rifle last Friday because his health was failing and he could not bear living any longer.

William Thornburgh, 87, of 915 Beech Ave., was discovered on the kitchen floor by his wife following a rifle report about 5:30 p.m. Friday. When a neighbor arrived a few minutes later, Thornburgh was already dead. **Getting Feeble**

The retired Santa Fe railroad telegraprapher had been contending with ill health for a long period of time already. Since a year ago he had been getting feeble. He hardly ate and whenever he tried to walk he kept falling down. His eyesight had but to fade as well.

that he would kill himself several times, to his wife, so that she did not pay much attention to him when he declared, Friday: "I won't put up with this and wait. Today I will shoot myself."

Charged to Company

Becoming impatient with the evasive tactics of the Torrance Sand and Gravel Company, in regard to correcting dangerous open sumps, the city took legal actions against the company by filing three complaints in the South Bay Municipal Court Tuesday.

The sudden action arose out of the dissatisfactions of the City Council at its last meeting with what had been done about the Sand and Gravel pit hazards. **Council Acts**

Councilman Willys Blount declared himself in favor of closing down the company. Councilman Victor Benstead moved that an investigation be held to see if the company was in violation of Ordinance 593 (the Kathy Fiscus Ordinance). If so, the attorney should take the necessary steps to prosecute.

Land Use Investigator George Powell signed complaints against Charles Shepard and Thomas Block, Monday, Powell had made repeated attempts to work out an agreement between the company and the Pacific Hills Homeowners Association which would be mutually agreeable.

At one time such agreement was reached. The company, however, was said to have submitted a reworded statement of the original agreement to the City Council. The revised agreement left
