Dentists discovered the value of fluorination when will be possible, Anderson said. they found that a Texas community was surprisingly lacking in tooth decay because of the high neventage natural fluorine in the city's water supply.

Fluorine will not affect the taste of the water. It is an inexpensive process and certainly worth whatever it may cost when one considers how much can

be saved in health and dental bills. Fluorination has received the endorsement of the United States Public Health Service and the American

Dental Association. There is only one danger with fluorination which must be constantly guarded against: fluorine is only one of the factors which can combat tooth decay.
