Teen-Age Dances Changed

Because of the low attendance
at the Torrance Teen Age Dance
in the Civic Auditorium on Sat-
urday nights, the Torrance Rec-
reation Department announces
a change in the dates for the
dance.

The next dance will be held
on January 16 instead of Janu-
ary 9, and for the next two
months the dance will be held
every other Saturday instead
of every Saturday.

The revised schedule is as
follows: Record dances on Jan-
uary 16, January 30 and Feb-
ruary 27. On February 13 there
will be a special Valentine
Party Dance with a live band.

Following the Dance on Feb-
ruary 27, an announcement will
be made concerning the dance
dates scheduled until the end
of the school year.

Harry Van Bellehem, recre-
ation director, says that appar-
ently the teen-agers are finding
the Skating Rink more attrac-
tive than the dance at the pre-
sent time and he feels that it
serves little purpose to hold a

or four couples as has been the
case for the past month and a
half. However, he wants to as-
sure the teen-agers that when
they start turning out for the
dance again, the Recreation
Department will be ready to
hold the dance every Saturday
night as it has in the past.

graduates, will assume roles in

uary 15 and 16.

El Camino this year. Miss Wil-

Blue," and "Anna Karenina."
Larsen is the feature editor of
the El Camino weekly news-
paper, the "Warhoop."

Janie Moffatt to write and di-

was one of the winners of the
one-act play festival. She also
appeared in "Heaven's a Devil-

the festival, and received the
best character portrayal award
of 1953.
