The Torrance Recreation Department has announced the closing of the Teen-Age Dance that has been conducted in the Civic Auditorium on Saturday nights. The last dance will be held February 27, and will be a record dance.

According to Harry Van Bellehem, director of recreation, the dances have not been very popular with the teen-agers since the start of the recreation program at the high school and the opening of the skating rink last November. No dance since last December has attracted more than 12 couples, and most of them have had fewer than six in attendance in spite of the fact that almost half of the dances, such as the Valentine dance, featured a live band.

Attempts to obtain a variance to erect a church at 171st street between Yukon and Prairie were faced with further delays this week. The Planning Commission, after granting such a variance, reopened the case later on during the meeting because of a street extension problem. The request for a variance, which was sent back to the Commission for re-study by the City Council recently, was granted by the Commission for the second time last week. The case was reopened once more during that same meeting by Commissioner H. R. Black who wanted to know how such a variance would be affected by the extension of Ainsworth avenue.

The Engineering Department has been asked to prepare a plot plan of the area. Depending on how the street extension will run, there is the possibility that 27 feet along the edge of the property will have to be dedicated to the city.

Though the interested parties had already left the Planning Commission meeting when the case was reopened, the Commission was in its rights to open the case. No case is legally closed until the end of the meeting, it was disclosed.

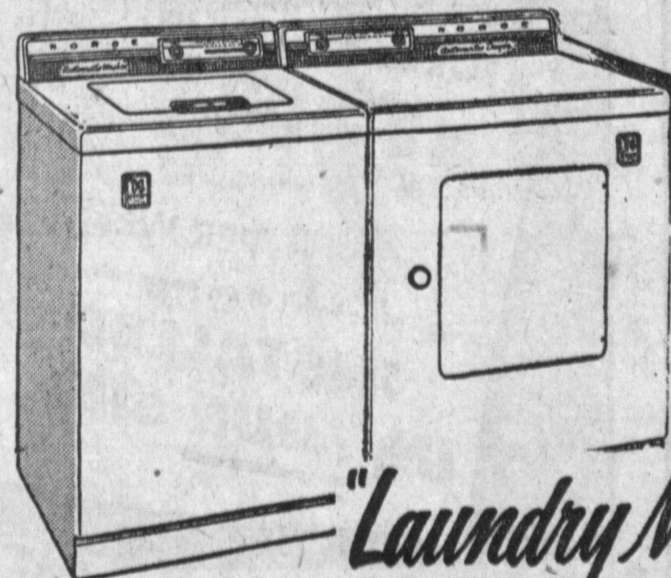
