

RABIES

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It consists of 14-21 shots administered to the abdominal region. Paralysis sometimes results, but the treatment is the only safeguard against the possibility of rabies.

Non-Injurious
Dogs as well as people are protected by anti-rabies vaccinations.

The new vaccine has not caused injury in nearly 2,000,000 recorded injections. Each batch of vaccine is certified as non-injurious by the United States Government. No dog has ever contracted rabies from the new vaccine, according to the Citizens Committee for Better Health which has been

spearheading the Los Angeles anti-rabies drive.

"The shots are no more painful than the penicillin shots given to cure an animal or man of diseases curable by this agent," D. J. Dean, D.V.M. revealed.

The Southern California Veterinary Medical Association has offered its services free at vaccination clinics, which can be held at convenient locations within the city. There are four companies licensed to produce the new miracle postwar vaccine. City laws require that purchase be made from the lowest bidder.

Establishment of a court here has been seriously discussed by local civic leaders since a census last autumn showed that the city has a population of 45,000 persons.
