Swift action followed in the wake of the city housing scandal when James S. Dresser, building inspector, and Cecil W. Smith, assistant building inspector, were suspended this week by the City Council on the recommendation of City Manager George Stevens.

Admitting the need in the Building Department for better supervision, better record maintenance, and more thorough inspections, the city manager declared that evidence indicates that the responsibility for what has occurred rests primarily with the two individuals who have been suspended.

An Open Letter . . .

A great majority of the population of the City of Torrance lives in newly constructed

There has been growing dissatisfaction with the type of construction permitted here by the authorities, and the merit of this criticism is supported by the State Housing Division's indictment of the City of Torrance. The City of Torrance building code is

known as the"Uniform Building Code of the State of California," and every qualified engineer and building inspector knows what is called for under this code. Since the Torrance Press first started re-

ceiving calls about homes now labeled "Krappy Kottages," efforts have been made to stir the official city family into action to correct the situation.

After six years of the City Manager form of government, under the direction of a civil engineer who has been responsible for the building department, we feel that this condition is uncalled for and bears the full consideration of the City Council.

And, because this is "election year," with a possible change of city administration in the offing, we do not think that anything hasty should be done in "cutting off heads" to save others' necks.

We believe that this matter should be given serious consideration by the City Council, and that the City Council majority should be held responsible for this unfortunate situation which has damaged the reputation of Torrance.

State Position

While we hold the Councilmanic majority responsible for this, we think that the incoming Council members should state their positions on the matter, because two of the seven candidates probably will be sitting in judgment on the investigation.

You are aware of the serious charges which have been brought against the City of Torrance and its building department relative to alleged laxity in inspections and building code enforcement of new homes constructed by the hundreds in this City during the past six years.

You are asking the people of Torrance to elect you to the City Council, to represent their interests in providing a good, stable government, such primary purposes being

protection of life and property. You will be called to pass upon the vital issues at stake, if a thorough investigation is made of the charges brought by the State

Housing Division. Investigation

Therefore, the Torrance Press asks you, and each of you, to make a thorough investigation of the charges against the City of Torrance and the Building Department, as made by the officials of the State Housing Division, and that you determine to your own satisfaction the merit of the charges.

After such determination, we ask you to state in writing to this newspaper what steps you believe should be taken and will take, if elected to correct such conditions as you find to be in need of correction.

We ask you to state what your intention is to protect the people of the City of Torrance against recurrence of conditions which might result in such charges as those


made by the state. Your statement, if presented in writing before Tuesday, March 9, at 5 p.m., will be printed in the next edition of the Torrance
