Absentee Ballots Available Now

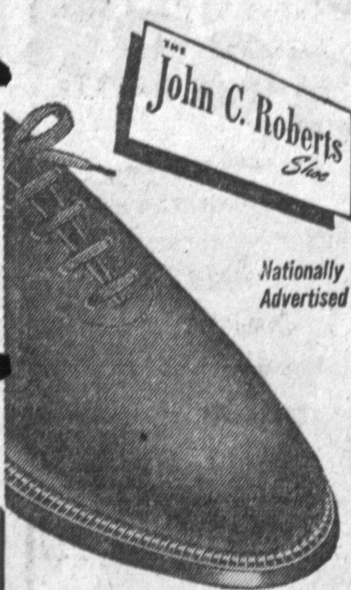
Absentee ballots for the municipal election April 13 may be obtained by written application any time up to April 8, according to City Clerk A. H. Bartlett.

Against The Swimming Pool

Note your Guest Editor is very much in favor of a swimming pool, usually I agree with Mr. Benstead, member of City Council, but this time I will have to be on the No Voting side of this issue. Reason No. 1: We have too many hazards for our children to face here in the city now without us creating another with a swimming pool to also drown some of them.

You will probably say it is not so; I will call your attention to the pool run by the county on Redondo Beach boulevard and Yukon avenue, where a child was found drowned either last year or the year before. And I understand this pool is properly supervised, but they do not keep a doctor there to examine children to see if he or she may have a heart condition or may be an epileptic who have no business in a swimming pool.

Reason No. 2: You could not have one swimming pool that would serve all sections of Torrance properly, therefore, if you have one, that would have to lead to four, and it is not only the construction cost of \$250,000 but the maintenance and operation cost will be very heavy as well. Look at the amount of water it will take to operate this pool. Then think of the natural swimming pool we have that surrounds the city of Torrance, and I believe ample to take care of those who may have a desire to swim without any cost of upkeep.

I say if we have \$250,000 that we want to spend on our children let's spend it on some of

the traffic hazards they have to face each day they go to school as well as play. Let's spend it on increasing the police department to such an extent that they will not have an alibi that they do not have enough officers to enforce our laws properly. I believe you will agree with me that our fire department needs to be enlarged and we should do something about it except talk.

Another department I believe could also be enlarged is Sanitation by the looks of the vacant lots on the shoulders of a great many of our streets. Don't get me wrong that I am opposed to recreation. I am not. I am for a diversified program properly supervised that will not jeopardize the lives of our children, any thing such as baseball or softball and more and enlarged playgrounds that can be used for increased recreation facilities I am for. Thank you.

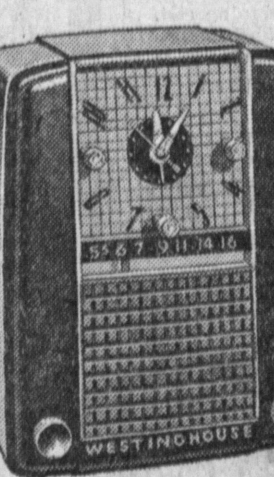
