A beautiful young mother and her nine-month-old night and the father was critically injured when the car collided with a stolen taxicab

at Pacific Coast Highway and Hawthorne blvd. Corralles Acosta, 24, rammed into the family car after jumping a red light at the intersection. He was driving a taxicab which he had stolen from the driver a few minutes earlier, according to Torrance police. Hurled 100 Feet

Killed were Mrs. Patricia Von Delden, 20, and her ninemonth-old son, Kim, of Glendale. The baby was thrown 100 feet and died several hours later at Harbor General Hospital. Mrs. Von Delden was dead on arrival. Her husband, Hugh Douglas Von Delden, 23, was taken to Harbor General Hospital with serious head injuries, according to police reports.

Acosta, a Mexican contract farm worker in Torrance, was held on two counts of suspicion of murder, grand theft, and suspected larceny of an automobile.

Seizes Cab Acosta sustained only slight injuries. He had ordered a cab at a Redondo bar. The driver, Frank Griffith, 30, of Redondo Beach, told police that Acosta suddenly seized the driver's call board and attacked him as they were driving south on Haw-

thorne blvd. Griffith finally jumped from the car which went out of control in the struggle. Griffith was left stranded near Old Sepulveda Road. A few minutes later, way 101 and Hawthorne blvd. where he crashed into the Von Delden car.
