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employees worked nearly 400,000 man-hours without a lost-time accident to win Pittsburgh Plate's top safety award, the "Certificate of Honor." In chalking up one of the safest years since the paint plant was placed in operation three years ago, they worked approximately 17,000 more man-hours than in 1952.

The Torrance plant played a major role in a new all-time safety record set by Pittsburgh Plate's paint division last year. Divisional lost-time injuries occurred at the rate of only 4 per million man-hours worked—the lowest frequency rate in the division's history. The Torrance plant is one of more than a dozen plants comprising the company's paint division.

Accident Rate Low
Wagen pointed out that the 1953 accident rates for the Torrance plant and the company's paint division are much lower than the national rate for the paint and varnish industry. According to the National Safety Council, the paint and varnish industry has seven lost-time accidents in each million man-hours worked.

However, compared to industry-wide safety statistics, the paint and varnish industry is relatively safer than most others. Latest figures from the National Safety Council show an 8.4 annual frequency rate for industry in general.

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my plan is sound or at least has some merits. I have drawn up plans for a hospital for this community which will be able to take care of the needs at this time and can be enlarged as time goes on to be able to take care of any possible need in the next fifty years.

This plan will necessitate the expenditure of about two million dollars in the next two years and possibly half a million a year for the next thirty years, depending upon the growth of the community.

This kind of money is here and can be had to do the job if the people of this city are sufficiently interested in their health to get together in a body to build the proper organization to do the job.

Now I know, and so do most thinking people, that unless we, as citizens, stop placing responsibility of building hospitals for us upon the doctors and a few business men, "we shall very soon find that in letting outmoded thinking of several hundred years ago stop us from taking care of our needs, that socialized medicine and Federal control of the same will be upon us.

It is an idea that is in force in England and a sad state of affairs it is. I refer you to what is happening in the medical field toward this end in an article in the March issue of the Reader's Digest entitled "The V.A. route to socialized medicine."

Will we rise to the occasion and get together and build a hospital where at least four major surgery rooms and three hundred patient rooms are available to our people? If you are interested in doing something of this kind, to again pioneer in something for Torrance and the surrounding community, write me a letter stating your views and how willing you might be to help organize a committee to go ahead in starting a movement in this direction. 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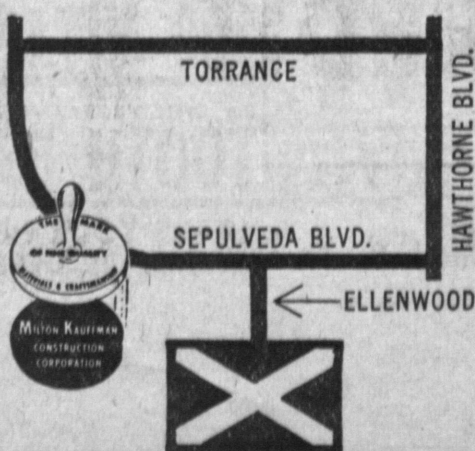

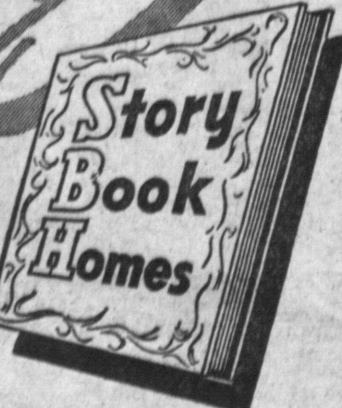
