Tretheway Denounces Incumbent

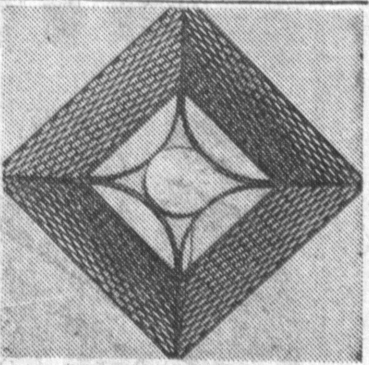
