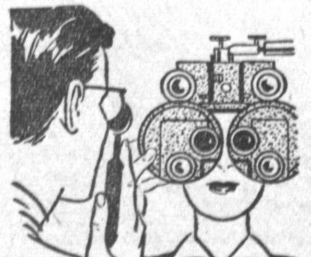

"While I am restricted in speaking for my authorities," Finch stated, "I can definitely state that the prime producers in my district (i.e. Douglas, North American, Northrop, etc.) are not facing any cutbacks dictated from Washington.
