



If a check has been previously endorsed ask the holder to sign his name again in your presence.

If in doubt about the validity of the check don't be in a hurry to cash it. If the applicant is a crook he wont be back.

It will also be most helpful to take several seconds longer to compare the identification. Usually it will be a driver's license. 
