Leppla real estate subdivision planning for the 6800 acres is still in the embryo stage. He estimated it would be six months to a year before any subdivision work would be started.

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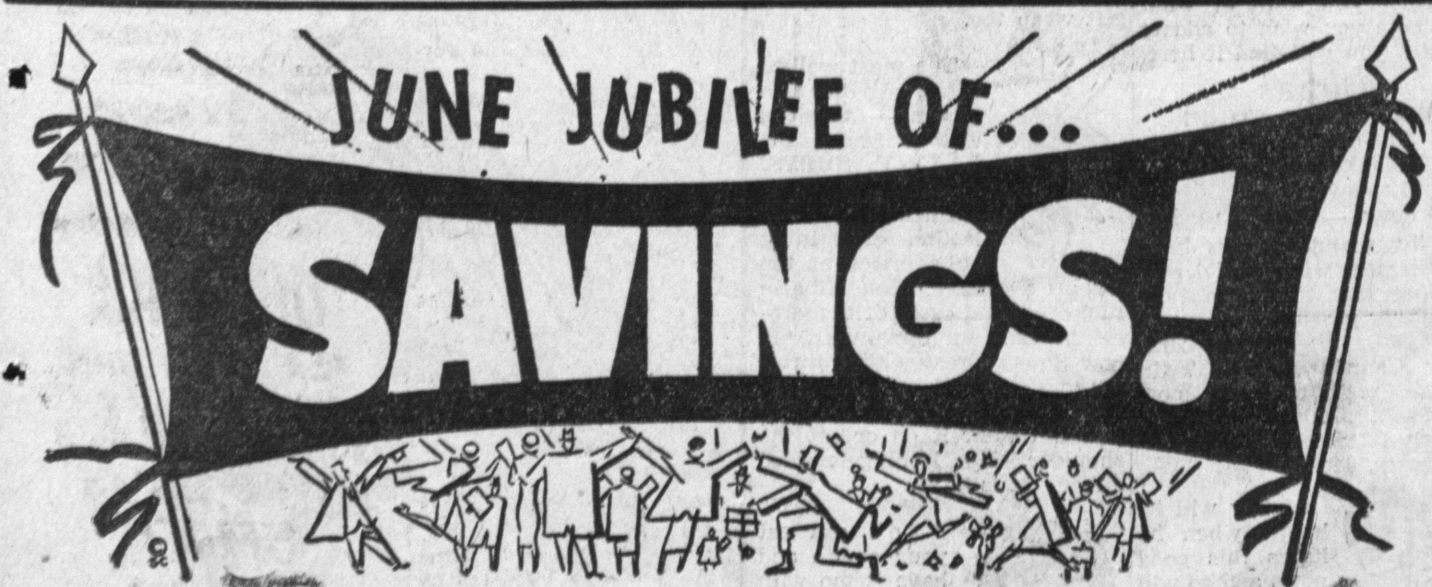
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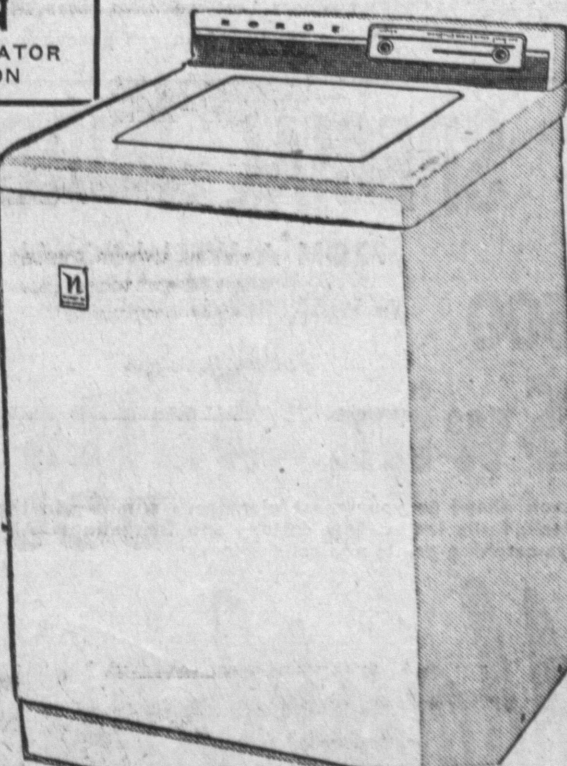
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
