*DEMOCRATIC **CANDIDATES FAVORED**

Results of Tuesday's primary election in the 103 precincts within the Torrance area indicated that voters adhered closely to party lines in nominating candidates for the November election.

A break-down of the votes cast for governor; the 17th Congressional and the 68th Assembly districts indicated that the Democratic candidates received the largest number of total votes cast in all but the gubernatorial contest.

Richard P. Graves (D) received the Democratic nod over Gov. Goodwin J. Knight (R) by a vote of 3897 to 3313.
