

2 DERRICKS COLLAPSE ONE WORKER KILLED

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Torrance Area Residents Vote By Party In Primary

DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATES FAVORED

Results of Tuesday's primary election in the 103 precincts within the Torrance area indicated that voters adhered closely to party lines in nominating candidates for the November election.

A breakdown of the votes cast for governor, the 17th Congressional and the 68th Assembly districts indicated that the Democratic candidates received the largest number of total votes cast in all but the gubernatorial contest.

Richard P. Graves (D) received the Democratic nod over Gov. Goodwin J. Knight (R) by a vote of 3897 to 3313.

CAPT. KLINE CLEARED OF ALL CHARGES

Captain Arnold R. Kline, former commander of the San Pedro Naval Supply depot and the Torrance annex of the depot, was exonerated of all charges of misuse of government property last Friday.

Kline's record was cleared completely by Federal Judge Ben Harrison.

Judge Harrison sharply criticized the US District Attorney's office for initiating the prosecution, stating,

"I have the feeling there was personal animosity on the part of the civilian personnel at the depot against the captain."

223 Seniors To Graduate Tonight At Torrance High

A total of 223 seniors will be graduated tonight from Torrance high school at commencement exercises to be held on the school's playing field starting at 8:15 p.m. Principal Bruce Wagner will present the class to Dr. J. Hospital Wing Hearing Goes To Council

Approval of plans to expand the Torrance Memorial hospital is being recommended to the city council by the planning commission.

Members of the Nativity Catholic church parish, led by Rev. P. J. McGuinness protested the issuance of the variance. Protests were based on the fact that the new hospital wing would be too close to the church's new youth center and that the increased parking needs would aggravate the already strained parking situation.

As an alternative, the church suggested that the construction of a new hospital is the best solution. A central location in West Torrance was recommended.

The city council will conduct a hearing sometime this month.

Flaming Tower Burns 4 Hours

3 ENGINES FIGHT FIRE

A flaming, 150-foot-high oil derrick came crashing to the ground after three fire-fighting companies battled the blazing torch for four hours. The fire took place Tuesday afternoon in the old Torrance field west of Pennsylvania avenue.

None of the firemen were injured.

Value
Destroyed in the blaze was the wood derrick which collapsed and plunged to the ground at the height of the battle and nearby equipment valued at \$3500.

The derrick was owned by William Davis, independent operator, who lives on the lease.

Davis said the well was scheduled to start pumping just before the fire reached it.

Cause of the blaze was not immediately determined. Battalion Chief Neil Whitney said,

MAN FALLS 75 FEET

One workman was killed and one injured in a 75-foot fall when a 122-foot steel oil derrick collapsed in Harbor city at Lomita boulevard and Normandie avenue late Tuesday afternoon, according to Lennox sheriff's deputies.

Two other workmen escaped.

Killed was Raymond Marbury, 52, of 132 South Mariposa, Long Beach. Marbury was crushed to death under the wreckage.

Hubert McCracken, 30, of 2000 West Spring, Long Beach, was taken to St. Mary's hospital suffering from shock and possible fracture of the pelvis bone.

The two men were helping dismantle the derrick so the well could be redrilled. As the last girder was removed the well collapsed, it was disclosed.

Escape Injury

Escaping injury were J. E. Livermore, 4302 Ken avenue, Lakewood, and Henry Snell, 3315 East Fourteenth street, Long Beach. They were fellow employees of the Albertson Construction company, which was dismantling the derrick for its owners, the Ring Oil company, on the Hawkins lease.

The city of Los Angeles has been sending out "use tax information and return forms" in order to collect a use tax of 1% of the total cost of the car, where a municipal sales tax was not charged.

City of Torrance residents who bought their cars in Torrance should return the form and indicate that they live in Torrance, not Los Angeles.
