Dresser Charged with Lack of Credentials

Charges that James S. Dresser, former Torrance building inspector, was guilty of practicing architecture without proper state certificates have been taken under submission by South Bay Municipal Court Judge Otto B. Willett.

Hearings on a complaint filed by the State against Dresser were completed this week. The case has been taken under submission until July 20.

Three Counts

In a complaint filed by Leo G. Whitaker, investigator for the Board of Architectural Examiners, Dresser was charged on two counts of practicing architecture without a license and a third count of practicing civil engineering without a license.

On two of the counts, involving property at 2420 Sepulveda blvd. Dresser was found not guilty. The charges were dismissed by Judge Willett at the request of the district attorney.

The third count charges Dresser with illegally practicing architecture in the design of an apartment building at 2515 Arlington Ave. The case has been

Dresser, former head of the city's building department, was suspended from office following charges of irregularity by state building officials. His assistant, Cecil Smith, was suspended at the same time.

Fired

A Civil Service Board suspended Dresser for 75 days and Smith for 60 days following a hearing into charges brought against the pair. The City Council overrode this action and fired both Dresser and Smith, who have indicated they will appeal the decision.

The suit filed in South Bay Municipal Court followed this action. John McCall represented Dresser and James Ford, deputy district attorney, acted as prosecutor. Jury trial was waived.

Witnesses in the case included Whitaker and G. H. Pulliam of the state Board of Architectural Examiners; Andrew Peterson of the Princeton Construction Company, which built the home in question, and H. M. West of the Torrance building department.

Fall Shool Enrollment To Reach 12,994 Figure

If you haven't already guessed, there'll be quite a few more students enrolled in Torrance school next year than there were last year. An official estimate by Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools, indicates as much.

Hull's figures indicate that total enrollment for elementary and high schools this fall will be about 11,794. When the estimated adult school enrollment of 1200 is added to this figure, the total will come to 12,994.

25% Increase

This represents at 25% increase over last year's enrollment figures. The average 1953-54 high school enrollment stood at 1212. High school and elementary enrollment was 7598. The grand total, including the adult school figure of 1208, amounted to 9806.

There'll be 9744 students in the elementary schools this fall, as compared with last year's 8925 figure.

Top Enrollment

Walteria elementary school will lead the way with an anticipated enrollment of 1069 students. North Torrance and Torrance elementary schools had a larger enrollment last year. These conditions will be eliminated this year partly with the completion of Carr and Wood schools.

About 1500 kindergartners will enter school for the first time next fall, Hull estimates.

At this meeting, B. C. Buxton, a veteran realtor of Torrance and a past board president, was presented with an inscribed honorary certificate of life membership in the board.

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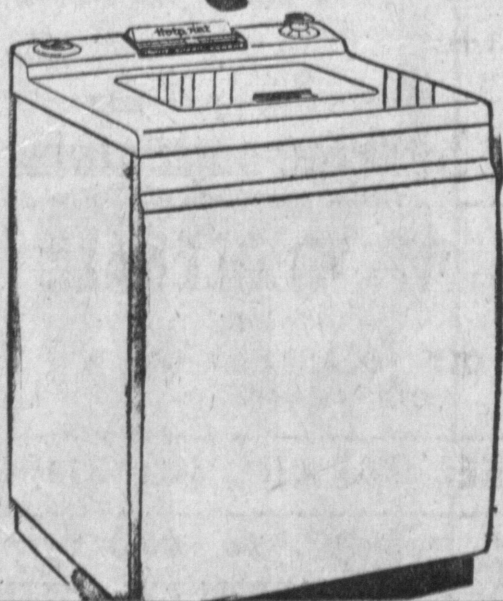
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
