cents per \$100 of assessed valuation, thus bringing the total tax figure for this coming year to \$1.195 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Enforcement of Sales Tax Upon the recommendation of Councilman Albert Isen, the city will call for a strict enforcement of the 1/2 % city sales tax. Isen felt that a lot of revenue is lost because of inadequate enforcement and policing and thinks that considerable additional revenue is available to the city by doing so.

Additional revenue will be needed after the first half year, City Manager George Stevens stated, and new means of raising will have to be discovered. He had no present suggestions on the matter.

Salary Boosts The total estimated operating budget for 1954-55 amounts to \$2,570,460. Seventy-five percent of this goes for salaries. It is expected that city employees will receive their annual 5% increase. A study is being made to bring a few of the departments more in line with what surrounding cities of comparable size are paying. This applies particularly to the fire department and police depart ment. Salary adjustments will be retroactive to July 1 followg a 45-day survey to be under-

The largest personnel increases are as follows: fire, 6; police, 5; street, 5; building depart-

ment, 2-3. The largest budget increases are scheduled for the city manager's office, building department, engineering, fire department, park, police, recreation, and street departments.

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
