\$3 Million Oceanarium To Display 5000 Sea Animals

Fishing crews of Marineland of the Pacific are working around the clock to collect 5,000 sea animals before the mid-Summer opening of the oceanarium, announced Kenneth Norris, curator.

The \$3,000,000 oceanarium located on scenic Palos Verdes peninsula 30 miles south of Los Angeles, will display species of sea life from all parts of the world for the observation of science, educators and sightseers.

Pushing toward the collecting goal, Marineland's crew aboard the Geronimo, is at sea for a week at a time, putting into Catalina's Avalon Bay or San Pedro harbor only long enough to store its catch in special holding tanks.

Largest in the World

The sea animals will soon occupy two of the largest salt water display tanks in the world. Spectators will be able to view the fish living under natural conditions through a continuous band of windows circling the tanks at three below surface levels.

Divers clad in regulation gear will enter the tanks approximately six times a day to feed the specimens to restrain their

appetites and allow smaller fish to live peacefully. The playful porpoises will be fed above the surface where their antics will provide thrills for the spectators seated in the 1500 seat stadium which surrounds the circular tank.

Picnic Area

Visitors to Marineland of the Pacific will find a large picnic area, the Marineland restaurant and bar, coffee shop, snack bar, the smart gift shop, film and flower shops. Marineland Inn will provide hotel accommodations and is being built in units, the first to be available on the opening of Marineland this summer.

Under the chairmanship of Mrs. J. W. Creager, the 259th place P-TA sponsored a potluck luncheon recently for teachers and room mothers. Mrs. J. O. Boderman arranged the table settings and P-TA members served coffee and tea.
