Rules

Any amateur photographer living within the circulation area of this newspaper may enter as many as six separate pictures in the contest, but no more than one per week.

Judges named to select the winners are Ralph R. Gompertz, assistant editor of the Torrance Press; James Giacalone, manager of A-1 Photo Supplies, and James Krueger, owner of Photo Arts Studio.

For the last two weeks of the Torrance Press annual amateur photography contest any pictures may be submitted so long as they were taken by individuals living within this paper's circulation area. Pictures need not be of a local nature!

Judging will be based on originality and composition. Any amateur lens-enthusiast between the ages of 8 and 80 is eligible.

Entries may either be brought or mailed to the Torrance Press office, 1406 Cravens avenue, along with the name, address, phone and age of the entrant.

Negative must be included with any picture that measures under 5 by 7 inches.

Pictures and negatives will be held in the Press office for the duration of the contest, at the end of which owners may claim them here. No pictures will be returned by mail.

recommendation favoring the new mortuary was the result of lengthy and thorough consideration and deliberations.

Arguments

Isen's main contention was that 1) mortuaries in a business district have a depressing "psychological" effect; 2) Cravens is an important business street and that even Stone and Myers gives one the shudders; 3) he would rather see a separate location set up for mortuaries; 4) these "beautiful, quiet buildings" will make Cravens into a Dead End street.

Interested parties on both sides spoke on the matter from the floor. It was pointed out that 1) Torrance has no other mortuary facilities at present except one; 2) that the city has no special Mortuary Row and

could not possibly create such a restricted area; 3) the new mortuary would not provide a parking problem; and 4) related businesses should be kept together.

City Manager George Stevens later in the evening indicated that planning can never be so perfect that one can avoid granting of variances. Los Angeles does not have a special area for mortuaries either, Stevens said.
