El Camino college started registration procedures for the 1954-55 fall term this morning by accepting telephone calls for counseling appointments, Merl F. Sloan, director of student personnel, announced today.

Appointments with the college's eight counselors may be made from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. daily by calling the college counseling office, ME 46631 or Plymouth 61421, Sloan indicated. The counseling staff will be available for consultation daily from 8 until 8, from August 4 to September 8. Classes for the fall term will start September 13.

Students who planned their programs with members of the counseling staff last spring need not phone for

registration appointments. The director of student personnel indicated that they would be notified of appointment dates by mail.

At the same time, he revealed that students enrolling for less than 10 units need make no appointment, but may register at any time from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Those telephoning for appointments will receive class schedules, information sheets, and registration materials by mail to facilitate registration, Sloan said.

Placement examinations will be given for the first time on Tuesday, July 27, at 6:30 p.m. and again on Saturday, July 31, at 9 a.m., Sloan announced.

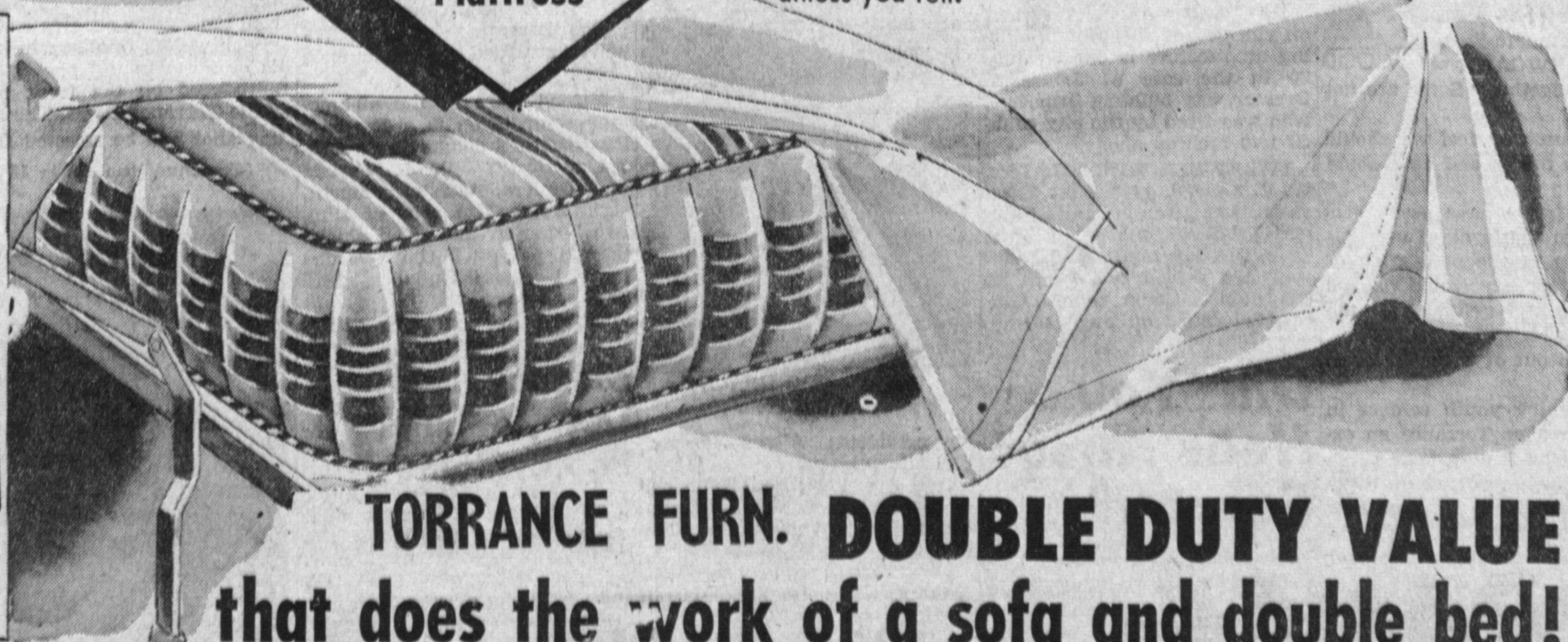
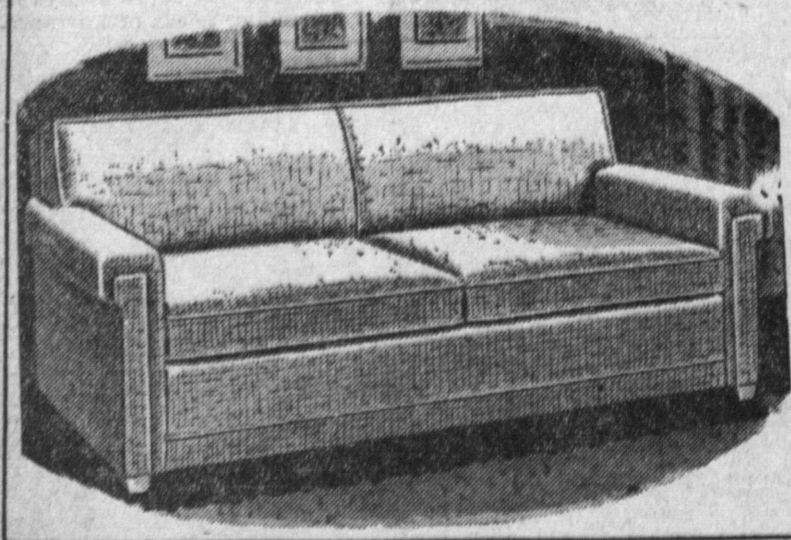

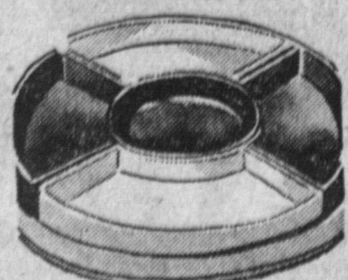
