Hearing Today On West Basin Water Issue

Final discussion of plans for curtailing pumping of water by West Basin users will be held Thursday at 6:30 p.m. at the Palos Verdes Country Club, according to Carl Fossette, secretary.

More than 100 representatives of water producing agencies are expected to review the Interim Agreement and Petition to voluntarily reduce annual pumping from the Basin by 37,000 acre feet.

All members will be asked to reduce pumping to a point equal to their "1949 prescriptive rights," in an effort to reduce expenses of the Basin. Edward Bowen, consulting engineer of the Settlement Committee, will outline the new plan for the new members.

The petition was drawn up by a committee headed by Rex B. Goodcell Jr.

25 - Bed Addition Granted

The County Regional Planning Commission approved construction of a new 25 bed addition to a hospital and a sludge drying pit at a public session last week.

Dr. Bowen Jenkins, osteopath, was granted a zone exception for his hospital addition to the clinic at 26311 S. Western avenue. The facility is in a Lomita Duplex urgency district.

In addition the clinic will construct an off-street parking area for patients using the clinic facilities.

The planners approved plans of County Sanitation District No. 2 to acquire 73 acres of land near Figueroa street and Lomita boulevard for drying of sludge from a nearby sewage treatment plant.

Conditions for the sludge strip include that Lomita boulevard be widened to 50 feet along the pit and that buffer strips 250 feet wide be maintained between the drying pit and the main thoroughfares.

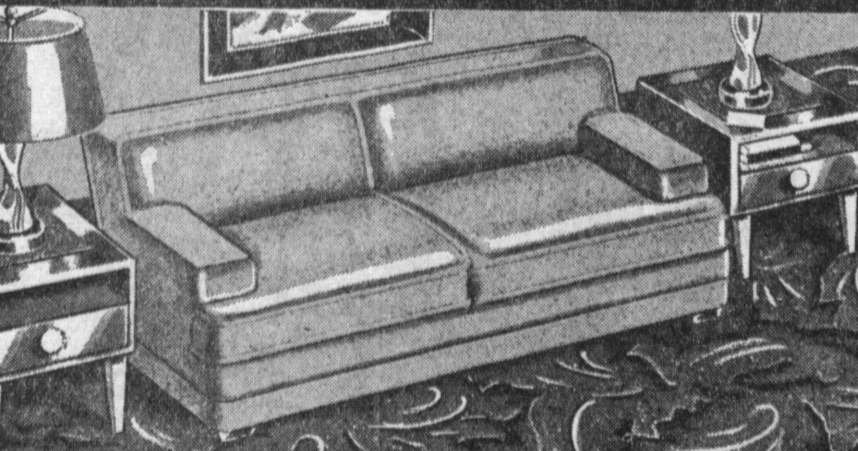
