

The development is located in the high altitudes of the Sierra Nevada Mountains that flank the eastern side of the reat San Joaquin Valley. The system is a composite of artificial lakes, long tunnels driven through solid granite, steel penstocks clinging to the sides of deep canyons and finally the powerhouses through which the energy of falling water is converted into electricity.
