TAPs - Class To Start Wednesday

The new fall rookie class of the Torrance Auxiliary Police (TAPs) will start August 23. Its first meeting will be held in the City Hall, Cravens and El Prado, from 7:30 p.m. to 9 p.m.

The class is open to boys and girls 12 to 16 years of age, who live within the jurisdiction of the Torrance Police Department. They will be trained to help Torrance police at various civic functions.

Applications must be picked up at the police station, next to the City Hall, and must be returned before instruction starts.

The six-week course includes instruction in police procedures, safety, juvenile laws, fire prevention, guns, and narcotics. From the rookie class students go to the advanced TAPs. This entitles them to participate in mountain hikes, rodeos, and other functions. TAPs and their activities are sponsored by the Police Association. Funds come from fund-raising events such as the policeman's ball or police shows held annually.

Lt. A. S. Thompson and Policewoman Maxine Herman are the instructors for TAPs.

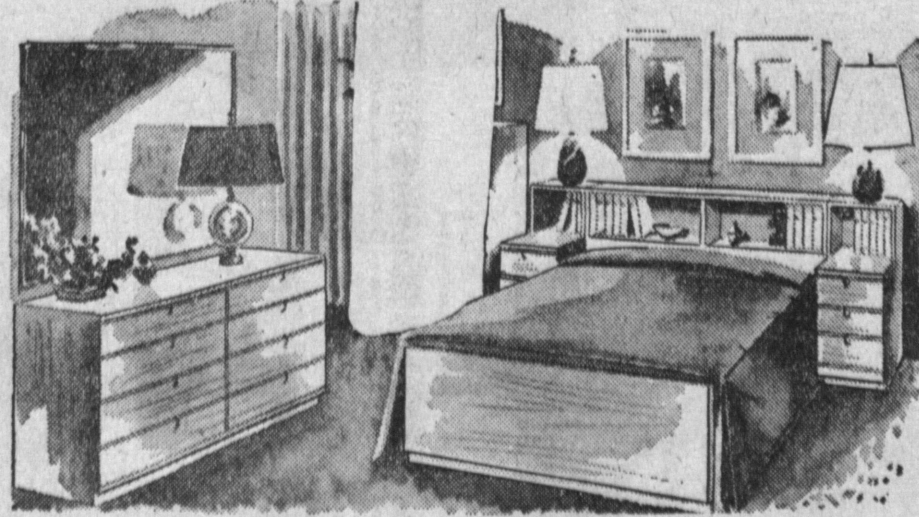
