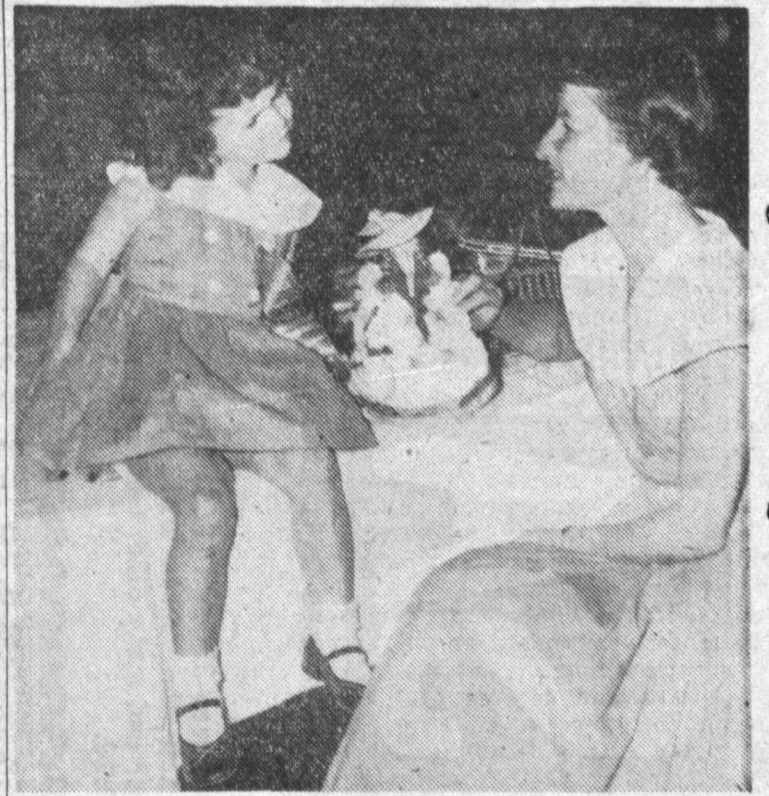
While staying with the Flanders the threesome enjoyed several side-trips including sightseeing, swimming, and just relaxing on the beach at La Jolla.
