these repairs were made. Wall-paper was left hanging, and plastered areas were left unpainted in a number of instances, it is claimed.

Homeowners also claim that fireplaces and garage floors are cracked and below standard.

"I think we should go on record that if any more of these college tracts come before us to vote against them," Councilman Albert Isen declared. "We'll keep going like this from week to week. . . the only way to get cooperation is to have the builder's activities in Torrance more or less hampered."

There was no immediate official response on the part of other council members. Isen recommended an arbitration board made up of three builders. Though the Council favored this, Paravano was opposed to the idea.

Both men arrived in Korea in April of this year.

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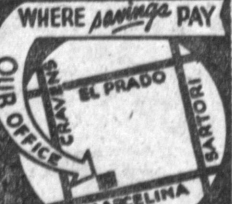
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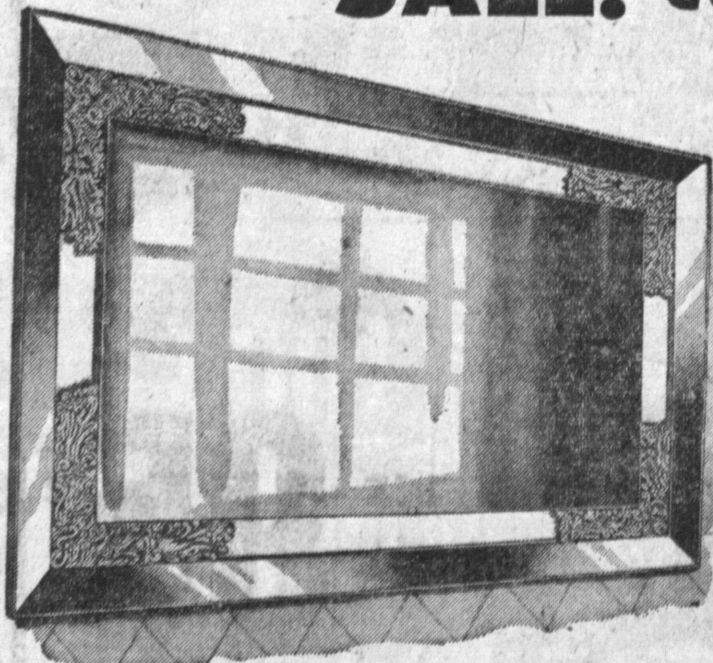
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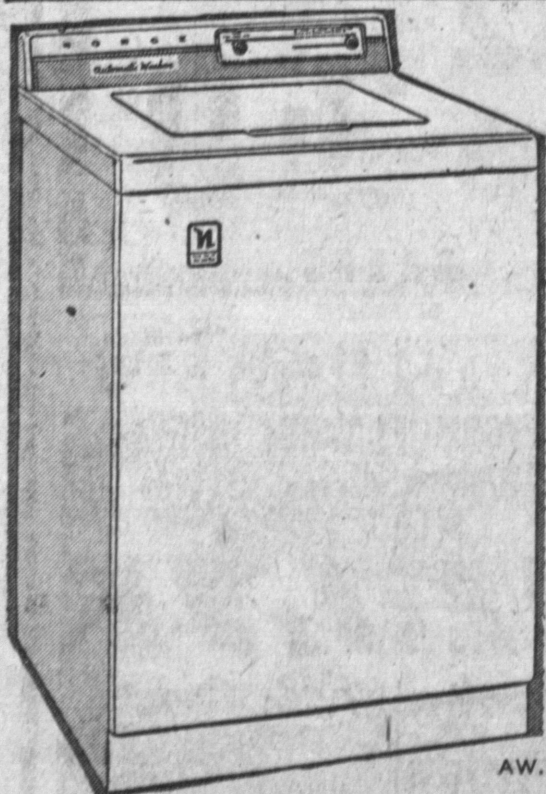
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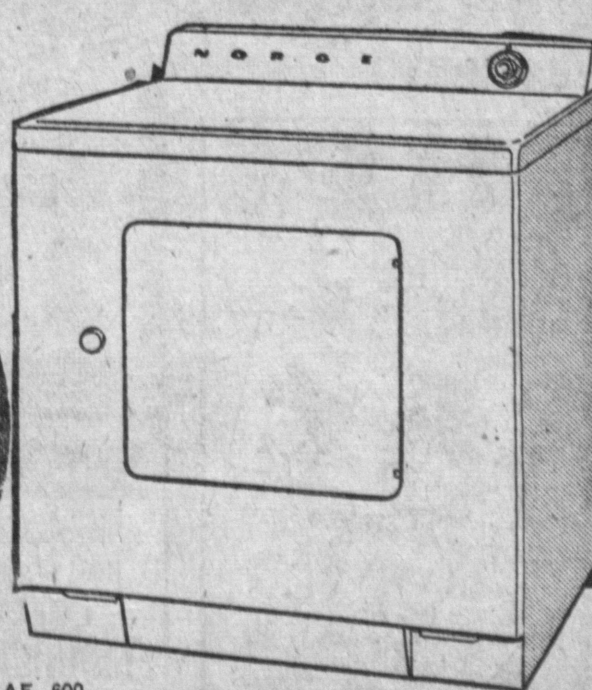
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
