Half-Streets Taboo Now In Torrance

No more half-streets will be approved by the Planning Commission and City Council in future subdivision developments, according to a recent ruling of the City Council.

The following regulations will apply according to City Engineer Ronald Bishop: When a minor "half"-street

is required for good planning, it will be necessary that a minimum of 37 feet be dedicated for a 10-foot parkway and a 27foot paved roadway.

The remaining 17 feet may

be dedicated at a later date to widen the street to a minimum right-of-way of 54 feet.

State Plans Employment Building

These buildings for Torrance and other California cities have been approved by Gov. Goodwin Knight and the project will be presented to the State Legislature at the next session. If the bill is passed money for the project will be put into the State budget by June 30.

Typical School Day Told

The Education Code of California lists 20 subjects which are required to be taught and specifies that a minimum of 50% of the school day be devoted to instruction of reading, arithmetic, writing and spelling.

Torrance teachers and administrators are meeting these requirements, school ofcials declared. Instead of teaching the 20 subjects separately, many of them are grouped to provide for better education.

A typical school day for an elementary school classroom would find approximately 40 minutes for arithmetic; 60 minutes for reading; 60 minutes for writing, speaking and spelling; 50 minutes for art and music; 50 minutes for health and physical education, including recesses; and 70 minutes for social studies, which include civies, geography and history, manners and morals, safety, fire prevention, thrift, alcohol and narcotics, humane treatment to animals, and science.
