"It is also my opinion that the barricading of the said streets, as a matter of principle, is contrary and directly opposed to the best interests of the public at large," McGinnis claimed.

For one thing, it creates dangers in cases of emergency, he maintained.

Jim Hayworth was third baseman for the Torrance Park team of the Junior Boys' Softball League for boys 14 and 15 years old.

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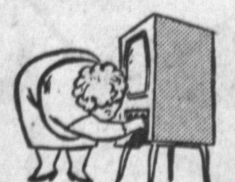
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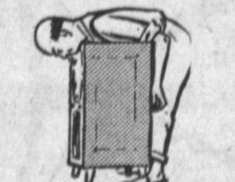
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
